Sprays are often purchased from pet stores but some veterinarians also offer them. Shampoo - Like sprays, shampoos are used only if your pet has fleas because there are no long-term preventive benefits. Shampoo for pet bath fleas can contain natural ingredients or permethrins to kill live fleas. Powder - Beneficial for carpets and other fabric surfaces, powder is used if there are fleas living in your pet environment. Flea bombs - Another option for treating the environment with flea infestation, flea bombs that produce fog or aerosols can penetrate into small spaces where fleas prefer to live. Everyone and pets need to leave the premises if a flea bomb is used as it can be toxic if inhaled. Collars - Historically, flea collars have only helped to keep fleas from the neck of a pet but new technology has made some collars much more effective in preventing fleas than older versions. In addition to all the different ways flea drugs can be applied, there are a variety of different drugs, as well as completely natural components, which are used in pets. Some are safe for both dogs and cats at appropriate dosages while others are toxic to cats.
